## ROUGH CONTENTS:

"Thrice glorious Sir, our Sov'reign, Lord, and King, Thy Presence doth glad News to Britain bring... Tho, Warlike-William, Sir, we must confess, Had not the Time to mind our First Address; Yet we expect a kinder Look from You. Brave, Generous George, our Valiant Prince, adieu."

Bookdealer says by Alexander Pennecuik, 1652-1722, Scottish physician and poet. PRINTED Broadsheet (FOLDED IN 4 to fit binding), bound in. TERRIBLE CONDITION: bottom left eighth wanting. Soft, tearing.

15. "Drunck and sober again Drunck and sober again But I shall ner be merry at heart till I'm drunck and sober again..."

16. "May Jacob \_\_\_\_ & soon possess..." [3 stanzas with choruses]
