

## Appendix A: Chronological index of dated and datable letters in MS 30.

## WARNING:

This is a rough list; use it with caution. Material in square brackets did not appear as an original date on the letter itself, but as a postmark on the envelope which was found in association with the letter, or as a later annotation on the letter or envelope, or is derived from the subject or appearance of the letter. But the envelope may have strayed; the postmark-of-origin may be a day or two after the date of writing; the postmark-of-receipt may be a week or so later. (Most of the postmarked envelopes have had stamps torn off, mutilating the original postmark, so that dating has been done from supplemental postmarks.)

If the annotator is dating the letter on receipt, it may be by the date of receipt; if the annotator is OK or Stead in 1909, he may have made a mistake; if the annotator is not OK, he may well have guessed wrong. In some cases the date on the letter may have been misread; in other cases an Old Style date may have been mistaken for New Style or vice-versa. Sometimes the writer himself may have erred.

Few of these letters have been properly analyzed by the cataloguer in this preliminary treatment; we welcome data from researchers.

Finally, this list has not been checked for typos; please bring errors to the attention of the manuscripts librarian.

## OLD STYLE/NEW STYLE:

In the 19th century Slavic countries still used the "Old Style" ("Julian") calendar, which ran 12 days behind the "New Style" (modern) calendar, so that May 1 OS is the same as May 13 NS. When writing from an OS country to a NS country it was customary to use both dates, separated by a slash, OS first. Postmarks of origin or of receipt by a OS country use OS only. All double dates in this index are filed by the NS form only.

## CONVENTIONS:

Months have been conventionalized as 3-letter English abbreviations; two-digit years have ~~not~~ been expanded; order of elements is year, month, day.

"[1866x1870]" means: Judging from the content (including watermark) this undated letter was written at the earliest in 1866 and at the latest in 1870. (This entry appears twice in the index: at the beginning of 1866 and at the beginning of 1870.)

"1870 Jan 28 [?]" means: Handwriting difficult and reading doubtful.

"1875 May [Mar?] 5" means: Month probably reads May, possibly March. (This entry appears twice if the two dates would be well separated.)

"1870 May 30/Jun 11" means: Dated by writer both in Old Style and New Style. The same entry in brackets probably means: Postmarked by a Slavic country; the cataloguer has added a New Style equivalent.

"1873 Jul 18/" means: Writer gives single date only, which probably is Old Style.

"1873 Nov 2/"16"" means: Writer produced an impossible OS/NS combination; not corrected.

Brook Street extends from Hanover Square to Grosvenor Square in Mayfair. In the early 19th century it contained early 18th-century residences, generally three stories high. J.E. Mivart started using 51 Brook Street as a residential hotel (monthly leases of apartments) in 1813 and by 1838 had acquired 5 contiguous houses (51, 53, 55, 57 Brook Street, and 48 Davies Street) which he used in this way. In 1827 Mivart's was "the fashionable rendezvous for the high Corps Diplomatique" including Russian nobility; in 1853 it was considered one of the three first-class London hotels.

In 1853 William Claridge became the proprietor of Coulson's hotel (49 Brook Street), took over Mivart's "with the exception of No. 57 which appears to have reverted to private occupation until at least 1881", and added no. 49 to it. Claridge's which continued Mivart's tradition of service to royalty and foreign nobility. The fronts were remodeled, but the interiors apparently stayed separate houses (or nearly so). The 1871 census notes 39 residents and 66 living-in servants. In 1881 Claridge's Hotel Company Ltd took over.

Although the 1889 Baedeker's ranks Claridge's as the best London hotel, the Company had plans for rebuilding, since the property was inefficient. By 1892 there were only 12 lettable suites of rooms altogether, and the hotel almost went bankrupt in 1892-3. Demolition began in Nov 1894. The old houses were replaced by a "high-class residential hotel" of seven stories, which was completed in Feb 1898 and re-opened in Nov 1898. (Based on Survey of London [by the Greater London Council] vols XXXIX-XL: The Grosvenor Estate in Mayfair. See XL plate 6:a for view of Claridge's before demolition; each house appears to have a door, although there is a central portico.)

Note, however, that the Post Office London Directory of 1849 treats Mivart's as a block, listing 41 residents without division. (The house-numbers used in the Survey and in OK's correspondence are the "new" numbers; those in the Directory are earlier. In 1870 Kinglake addresses her at 44 Brook Street; if this was part of Claridge's it is probably the old number for present 51 Brook Street.)

It is probable, therefore, that street-addresses for Claridge's are indicative of the house OK was living in, and therefore of the date. But it is also true that if the writer erred in the address, the letter would have reached OK anyway; so any specific anomaly may be meaningless. It is extremely unlikely, however, that a letter would be addressed to Claridge's between Nov 1894 and Nov 1898.
